TANYA AGATHOCLEOUS is Associate Professor of English at Hunter College, CUNY. She researches and teaches Victorian literature and culture, as well as twentiethcentury Anglophone literature in transnational, colonial, and postcolonial

contexts. She is interested in the relationship between transnational political ideals and literary form, and in bridging the gap between Victorian, modernist, and postcolonial scholarship. She is the author and editor of several books, including *Urban Realism and the Cosmopolitan Imagination in the Nineteenth Century* (Cambridge UP, 2011), *Teaching Literature: A Companion* (Palgrave MacMillan, 2002), and *George Orwell: Battling Big Brother* (Oxford UP, 2000). She also edited the Broadview Press edition of Joseph Conrad's *The Secret Agent* and a special issue of *Victorian Literature and Culture* on "Victorian Cosmopolitanisms."
